

Key Vocabulary

- <u>abstract</u>- art which doesn't represent reality but rather uses shapes, colours and textures for an effect
- <u>realistic</u> art which represents things that are true to life
- <u>cartoon</u> a simplistic drawing/picture/ painting
- **background** –the part of a painting furthest away from the viewer
- <u>foreground</u> the part of a painting closest to the viewer

Skills to be taught

- Colour mixing / Colour Wheel complementary colours.
- Painting techniques to create planets/ stars eg. flicking. smudging, use of templates
- Abstract art

- "It finally occurred to me that I could easily paint an abstract background on a blank board or canvas with the left over paint."

Possible Experiences


• Experiment with creating planets and stars on black paper, explore colour mixing, detailed drawings of objects that floating in space.



Possible experiences


 Look at existing dragon eyes sketched and drawn by existing artists. Design and develop own ideas for a reptilian eye.

Key Knowledge

Wildlife study of reptilian eyes -

Reptiles usually have round or vertical (slit) pupils, although a few of them have horizontal pupils. Turtles and most lizards have round pupils. Snakes can have either round or vertical pupils. Crocodilians and geckos have vertical pupils.
